Smoking in Pregnancy



Increases the risk of complications in pregnancy and of a child developing a number of conditions later in life:

obesity, diabetes, low birth weight, premature birth, problems with ear, nose and throat, respiratory conditions

> 566 infants were born to smoking mothers in Bedfordshire (2015-2016)

Smoking during pregnancy causes up to **21 miscarriages and 1 perinatal death**every year in
Central Bedfordshire

Babies born in Central Bedfordshire (13.9%) live with a smoker in the household
